Knights of Columbus Joseph J. Fitzmartin Council # 1446 Greenville, PA

Thanks to the efforts of Father Michael J. McGivney, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven and some of his parishioners, the Connecticut state legislature on March 29, 1882, officially chartered the Knights of Columbus as a fraternal benefit society. The Order is still true to its founding principles of charity, unity and fraternity.

The Knights was formed to render financial aid to members and their families. Mutual aid and assistance are offered to sick, disabled and needy members and their families. Social and intellectual fellowship is promoted among members and their families through educational, charitable, religious, social welfare, war relief and public relief works.

The <u>history of the Order</u> shows how the foresight of Father Michael J. McGivney, whose cause for sainthood is being investigated by the Vatican, brought about what has become the world's foremost Catholic fraternal benefit society. The Order has helped families obtain economic security and stability through its life insurance, annuity and long-term care programs, and has contributed time and energy worldwide to service in communities.

The Knights of Columbus has grown from several members in one council to 15,342 councils and 1.9 million members throughout the United States, Canada, the Philippines, Mexico, Poland, the Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Panama, the Bahamas, the Virgin Islands, Cuba, Guatemala, Guam, Saipan, Lithuania, Ukraine, and South Korea.

<u>Our charitable activities</u> encompass an almost infinite variety of local, national and international projects. From international charitable partnerships with Special Olympics, the Global Wheelchair Mission and Habitat for Humanity to our own Food for Families and Coats for Kids projects and other local charities, the opportunity to work together with fellow Knights and their families is virtually endless. In 2016, the Knights of Columbus set a new all-time record for the 18th consecutive year. Our charitable donations increased from \$175 million in 2015 to a new total of \$177,500,673 in 2016. In addition, we achieved our highest level of charitable service in 2016, volunteering more than 75 million hours of service.

On November 7, 1909 the Supreme Council granted a charter for Council #1446 to 59 charter members. The first member listed on the Greenville membership is Benjamin F. Brown who had joined the Order in December of 1908, in Sharon. Brown served as the first Grand Knight of the local council. The first Financial Secretary was Frank A. Denslinger, and the first Warden was James Collinan.

The "Admission Degree", was held in Greenville, and took place on November 11, 1909, at the hall of the Ancient Order of the Hibernian in the Christopher Building on Clinton Street, which was across the street from the Post Office, at the current site of the parking lot behind the Mechenbeir Building.

The Greenville Knights of Columbus had its first club room in the early 1920's over the T.C. Gibson clothing store, later to be the Penney's department store. This club room became one of the many casualties of the Great Depression. Starting in 1933 meetings were held upstairs of the building which housed Schiff Shoes. In 1935 the Knights of Columbus purchased the building at 145 Main Street, from William Reagle. This building later housed the State Store. The building was sold and the facilities were then moved to the Ghiates Building at the corner of Mercer and Main Streets in the early 1950's, where the club rented the upper two floors. The council offices and meeting area and lounge was on the second floor and third floor was sub-let to Mary Ann Brown's Dance Studio. It was also used for large meetings and council dances. A weekly teen dance was also held there on the weekends in the early 60's.

The Council 1446 continued to grow and increase in Membership and today has a membership of approximately 375 men. In 1965 it was decided to build a facility at 170 Clarksville St. At that time the council was named Joseph J. Fitzmartin Council 1446, in honor of a charter member who donated countless hours of service to the organization.

In addition to our Council's primary commitment to St. Michael Church, St. Michael School and St. Margaret Mission in Jamestown the Grenville Council is proud to help support many local community organizations, such as; The Good Shephard Center, Greenville & Jamestown Food Pantries, Willow Women's Center, Williams House, The Salvation Army, and A.W.A.R.E.

Our "Coats for Kids Program" annually donates 144 winter coats to the children of the Greenville area through the distribution centers of the Salvation Army and the Good Shephard Center. Our Forty Cans for Forty Days project during Lent, has provided thousands of pounds of goods for distribution to Greenville and Jamestown Food Pantries.

Annual Baby Bottle Campaign, this annual fundraiser supports the Culture of Life activities supported by our Council and Assembly. These activities include: the annual bus trip to Washington DC for the Pro-Life march in January on the anniversary of the Rowe vs Wade decision; The Missionaries of Purity program; The Ultrasound project at the Willow Women's Center in Transfer, William's House in Greenville and the Ultrasound initiative of the Supreme Council.

The triad emblem of the Fourth Degree:

The emblem features the dove, the cross and the globe. The dove, classic symbol of the Holy Spirit and peace, is shown hovering over the orb of the Earth (globe). Both are mounted on a variation of the Crusader's cross, which was found on the tunics and capes of the Crusading knights who battled to regain the Holy Land from the pagans.

Spiritually, the sacred symbols on the emblem typify the union of the Three Divine Persons in one Godhead, the most Blessed Trinity.

- The Globe God the Father, Creator of the Universe.
- The Cross God the Son, Redeemer of Mankind.
- The Dove God the Holy Spirit, Sanctifier of Humanity.

The colors of the symbols are:

- A blue globe with the land of the Western Hemisphere in white.
- A red cross with gold borders and gold knobs at the end of the points forming the ends of the arms of the cross, also known as the Isabella cross.
- A white dove.

Red, white and blue are the colors of the flag of the country in which the Knights originated. They are used to stress patriotism, the basic principle of the Fourth Degree

They are most recognized by wearing of the Regalia, while participating in Church and Community events. The color of the Cape and Feather Plume denotes the offices they hold or have held.
