St. Boniface Parish Erie Synodality Listening Sessions Parish Report April 2022

During the months of February and March, 2022, nine listening sessions were held at St. Boniface Parish to provide the opportunity for parishioners and others to answer discussion questions on a selection of ten topics given to us by the Vatican, and under the direction of the Erie Catholic Diocese. The fundamental questions we were to present were: A Synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together." How is this "journeying together" happening in your local Church? What steps does the Spirit invite us to take in order to grow in our "journeying together"? Our facilitators adopted a vision of: As God's pilgrim people journeying together, how can we more effectively bring the life-giving power of the gospel to a world so desperately in need of it? Each individual session opened with a scripture reading and prayer to the Holy Spirit for guidance with our dialogue.

In addition to the live listening sessions, a paper questionnaire was also available for people to submit their responses anonymously. A total of 66 individuals attended the various listening sessions, with the largest group of 13 attending the last session, "Suds and Synodality." Only a couple of paper questionnaires were returned. The majority of participants were long-time, faithful, parishioners; although some younger parents, teens, and single young adults attended the sessions as well.

Taking into account that during this period that we held the listening sessions, we were just emerging from the most recent and worst outbreak of COVID-19, which by itself, hampered and delayed significant activities at our parish. Comments such as, "We used to do this" were common. Also, please keep in mind that "perception is reality." Every participant has a different background and faith journey that is real and valid to them, regardless of how well we think we've done things in the past. That said, all participants responded in a positive frame of mind where they wanted to be helpful in providing feedback. A small number of participants could not think of any opportunities for improvement, but spoke of their personal faith journeys and expressed wanting to continue sharing their faith with others in small groups. Our summarized words to describe the overall sessions were: Honest, Inspiring/Community-building, and Spirit/Faith-filled.
