Dear Parish Members:

As we are seriously into our 3<sup>rd</sup> month of restrictions and consciousness about Coronavirus contagion, and as we struggle to 'accept what we cannot change' we are clearly humiliated as being human beings, the highest evolved and developed creature on earth! We were 'brought low' from our prestigious pedestal and cowered unceremoniously to avoid becoming ill or causing the illness in others. For the most part, we have been as successful as possible and should be grateful to all who gave positive directions and to those who followed them. Be safe and be careful as we anticipate a relaxation of restrictions, but be conservative and cautious as well. Maintain 'safe' distancing, use facial masks, wash your hands and sanitize a LOT. Recklessness and self-centeredness can backfire and create a 'surge' of contagion and cost lives of innocent neighbors, relatives and friends.

As we are about to return to open Mass celebrations and Sacramental practices, we will have to be protective. Distancing and mask wearing will be the 'norm' for the foreseeable future. Each parish will have to have a plan that will mark spacing, require masks, do redundant sanitizing and whatever else is common sense within the respectful practice of our services. Please politely comply for your safety and that of others as well.

1. Visit the church for private prayer and devotion. St. Lawrence remains open and available for your 'visit to the Blessed Sacrament, meditation, Stations of the Cross, spiritual practices individually and as family. Come to God's house and be at peace.

2. Read the daily Scripture liturgical readings in church or at home for personal prayer and meditation.

3. Pray as a family – parents with each other, parents and children together, for your family and friends that this time of stress can be a time of welcoming the Holy Spirit to bring you peace and comfort with each other. Family rosary is a repetitive and calming prayer of devotion to Mary as being the 'mother of faith and family.' Be brave enough to share your faith with each other that God will, indeed, respond with grace and support for you and your family in all things that are good.

4. Take turns leading meal prayer with family at the table together. Don't drag a sandwich to your room to watch television, computer and snack – meal time is family time... to nourish communication and family bonding. If you feel like you're drifting apart – you probably are.

When the Pandemic fear was starting, I took time to call every phone number on our parish registry to see how everyone was doing and if there was something the parish could do to help people, especially those who lived alone. I am about to begin that call list again but want to draw your attention to one problem I discovered... a LOT of phone numbers were 'disconnected' or 'not in service' and one even was answered by a total stranger in North Carolina who was startled to get a call from Albion! Perhaps replacing 'land lines' with cell phones accounts for this problem. Nevertheless, the following registered parish members have no working phone number on our registry!
