

## Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Mary's place in salvation history has been honored from the earliest days of the Church. This particular feast appears in liturgical books in the middle of the fifth century and reminds us that although Mary died, through the power of the resurrection she was not held captive by the chains of death. While the life and death of Mary is commemorated today, we at Our Lady of Fatima Chapel and Saint Teresa Church must also consider what awaits us in eternity. As Paul tells the Corinthians and all of us in the second reading of our liturgy, "Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep." Through God's mercy, now all who believe in Him can share in His victory over death. Is it any wonder that Mary, the woman who bore Jesus, was justified by her faith in Him and was assumed into heaven upon her death? For all of us, the Blessed Virgin Mary is an exemplary woman of faith and an instrument of God's plan of salvation. Even as a very young woman, Mary, in her beautiful Magnificat recognized the right order the Savior would bring to the world and the joyful dependence of God's people. We, like Mary, must place our trust in God, and believe that His promises to us will be fulfilled.

MEMORIAL GIFT Please be aware of the new ciborium being used in the celebration of Mass. A ciborium is the vessel that holds the consecrated hosts—the Body of Christ—to distribute during communion, and also to reserve the Eucharist in the tabernacle. The ciborium was donated by the family of Margaret Greaney Brahm. A letter that accompanied this gift explains the significance of the memorial, and also a brief biography of Margaret's life. These missives are posted on the bulletin board in the Chapel lobby. We are grateful for this donation and pray that Margaret lives eternally in the presence of the Risen Christ.

Notable Dates Monday, August 16 is the memorial of St. Stephen who is thought of as the founder of the kingdom of Hungary, its first king, and established Christianity there. Friday, August 20, is the memorial of St. Bernard, Abbot and Doctor of the Church. St. Bernard was a nobleman who joined an abbey in France. Many of his family members and friends followed in his footsteps. Bernard wanted to follow and lead others to Christ, not to himself. He used his gifts for leadership, arbitration, writing, and creating harmony in the abbey to give glory to God.

On Saturday, **August 21, we remember St. Pius X,** Pope. As pope at the turn of the last century, St. Pius X reformed the liturgy and breviary, promoted Gregorian chant, opposed Modernism, and lowered the age of first Communion from twelve to seven. St. Pius had humble origins and never lost his love for simple, accessible liturgy and expressions of doctrine.

<u>A Family Perspective</u> "Blessed is the fruit of your womb" can be said of all mothers, because every child is "blessed" and a child of God upon whom God "looks with favor." This is our deepest identity and destiny. We do not earn this blessing. God's love is a free gift to each of us.

Masses for our deceased loved ones: The Church teaches us to pray for the dead that they may live eternally in the presence of God. There is no greater prayer than the holy sacrifice of the Mass. If you wish to have a memorial Mass said, please place your request in the collection basket, and include your name and contact information and the name(s) of the deceased. If you wish, you may request a specific date and time for the Mass; however, please be aware that the date and time you request may already be filled, in which case the Mass will be scheduled as close as possible to your request. Alternatively, you may contact Natalie Wilmoth directly at 814-397-4933 to arrange a specific schedule. The normal donation of \$10 should also be placed in the envelope with your request.

## Blessed are you who believed (Luke 1:45)

When the angel Gabriel told Mary that she was to have a son, she asked, "How can this be?" (Luke 1:34)? But the angel assured her that it would happen through the Holy Spirit, and Mary believed him. That's why, in today's Gospel for the feast of the Assumption, Elizabeth calls Mary "blessed" - because she believed (1:45).

A virgin birth is not the only truth of our faith that defies a natural explanation. We might also wonder how Jesus was fully God and fully man, or how, after lying in His grave for three days, He rose from the dead. But while we don't know the how, we do know the why: so that our loving God could save us from sin and death.

Mary's bodily assumption into heaven is another truth that can't be explained on a natural level. Again, we don't know how it happened, but we do know why. By saying yes to the angel's request Mary gave birth to the Savior of the world. Because of this yes, she played a central role in our salvation. And so God greatly honored her by allowing her to share fully in the fruit of Jesus' victory over sin and death even now, before He comes again in glory.

One day we too hope to share in Christ's victory. At His second coming, the corruptible will become incorruptible (1 Corinthians 15:54). Our bodies will be brought to life again as spiritual bodies, and we will see Mary in all her beauty and splendor.

We don't know how this will happen. But that's where faith comes in. As Elizabeth said to Mary, *Blessed are those who believe*. We are truly blessed when we choose to believe that all of God's promises will be fulfilled. And when we struggle to believe, we only have to turn to Mary our Mother. She is always eager to intercede for us and lead us into the loving arms of her Son, Jesus.
